

Trust in God has always been at the heart of Rostro de Cristo. Our founder, Fr. Ronan, often reminds us that Rostro exists because God's grace has made it so. For thirty-four years our invitation to young people to choose to leave the familiar and comfortable, and live and serve on the peripheries in communities among the highest levels of impoverishment comes from a deep awareness that God's grace is necessary. It is revealed in the volunteers and retreat participants, our neighbors and partners who receive them and share life with them, and board members and benefactors who offer their time, talent and treasure in support Rostro's mission. Witnessing our neighbors each day place their trust in God inspires us to do the same, and reminds us that trust does not come easy. It comes from enduring moments struggle, doubt, fear, hardship. Reaching limits, and still believing; finding hope and a way forward.

Such was the case on a sweltering Guayaquil evening last January when Rostro de Cristo volunteers Lilly, Maggie, Mark, Nicole, and Steven learned that in the face of growing gang violence in Monte Sinai it was no longer possible for them to remain. Rather, they were asked to relocate to Quito, Ecuador's capital, where they could continue to serve the Ecuadorian people. Despite feeling disappointed and sad to leave people they came to love, volunteer Steven Zichichi said, "We trust that God is guiding you in this decision and that Rostro staff and board know what's best for us and for Rostro." Steven voiced what we needed to hear - the moment was invitation to trust God. The continuation of a commitment made six months earlier when they made the choice to serve a world in need - scared by a global pandemic, social injustice, loneliness, and violence. Trusting in God's guidance and providence, so much part of daily life in Monte Sinai, gave us all hope in moment doubt and fear.

After a brief return to Monte Sinai to say goodbye and collect their belongings, the volunteers and Rostro de Cristo fellow Erin Scherer moved to Quito. As a result of their choice and the support and dedication of so many who support Rostro de Cristo, today Rostro de Cristo volunteers are living in the community Tinwinza, on the edges of Quito sharing faith, serving the community, being neighbor, and having their lives changed by these encounters.







We are grateful to Erin, Hannah, Lilly, Maggie, Mark, Mattie, Nicole, and Steven. We are also grateful to the Center for Working Families in Quito who received the volunteers when they arrived from Guayaquil, provided housing and opportunities to serve. Erin lead the search for a more permanent location and due to her efforts we have been warmly welcomed to Nuestra Señora de la Asunción Parish. Today's volunteer community is helping to expand the educational programs under the leadership of the Hermanas de la Escuela Cristiana, serve the elderly, and support local nutrition programs.

The challenges of the last few years only confirm that our mission is needed now as much as ever. With Rostro de Cristo young people are invited to make a choice to trust in God and offer a hopeful response to the many situations of pain and brokenness in our world. Through Rostro de Cristo's programs, communities in need are served and members of the next generation are shaped by faith, informed by intercultural experiences in Ecuador's most underserved communities, and grounded in hope. They leave inspired to live lives of service to others and to do their part to build God's kingdom.

It is your commitment to supporting our mission that makes this possible. May you and your family enjoy

the blessings of the Advent and Christmas seasons.

FELLOWSHIP UPDATE 2022-2023

Rostro de Cristo's Fellowship Program: "Inspiring a lifelong commitment to a faith that works for justice..."

Recruiting from our 300 alumni and beyond, Rostro de Cristo initiated a fellowship program based in Ecuador. By leveraging the professional skills and experiences of those who have served before the Rostro de Cristo Fellowship Program increases our capacity to expand programming and deepen our impact in Ecuador. We were blessed with three professional women in our first cohort: Erin Scherer (RdC volunteer 2004-2005, Mattie Gottbrath (RdC volunteer 2018-2019), and Hannah Klein (JVCI 2019-2020).

As the year unfolded Erin, Mattie, and Hannah played an essential role in helping to reestablish our community in Monte Sinai and expand our ministry. Their strong connections with neighbors and partners proved invaluable as we determined the path we needed to take to keep our team safe during rapidly deteriorating circumstance.

Upon moving to Quito, Erin drew from her years of experience of ministry in Latin America and her social work background to guide us as we establish our new location in Tinwinza and partnership with Nuestra Señora de la Asunción Parish.

Mattie and Hannah returned home last spring, and Erin will return to her home in Denver, CO this month. Rostro de Cristo alumna, Kaitlyn Buehlmann (2014-2015), has stepped forward to serve as our Program Coordinator in Quito. Kaitlyn will work closely with Associate Director, Ana López (RdC 2012-2013), to support our Retreat Program and volunteer community.

We are so grateful for these remarkable women and all our alumni who continue to live a life of faith and a commitment to creating a more just society in the U.S. and beyond. We look forward to further developing the fellowship program in 2023.

In August of 2022 five Rostro de Cristo volunteers returned to our home in Monte Sinai for the first time since the pandemic. On October 16, 2022, we inaugurated the Rostro de Cristo Mustard Seed Award with a Mass of Thanksgiving and a Luncheon Reception which included the Presentation of the Awards to our honorees:

Pat McTeague and Sonya Rendón have been great friends to Rostro de Cristo since our beginning. Drawn to work together by their shared faith and their belief that a quality education is the main pathway to overcome poverty they founded the Nuevo Mundo (New World) School and Foundation. Generations of Rostro de Cristo volunteers and retreatants have been impacted by them. In the words of Fr. Ronan, "Pat and Sonya have been a truly formative inspiration in their relationships with our volunteers due to the relationships they have had with the people they serve which is, of course, fueled by their relationship with God which has caused them to dream and envision a new world."

Paul Saleeb, M.D. is a Rostro de Cristo alumnus (1999-2000) and physician in infectious disease. Since his year with Rostro Paul has volunteered in Kenya and Sudan; conducted research and offered technical support in Mali and Tanzania; and served as a resident faculty director in Botswana. In addition, he has worked at the National Institutes of Health. Currently, Paul practices medicine in Baltimore and serves on the faculty of U. of Maryland School of Medicine. Rostro de Cristo volunteer and Paul's community-mate in Ecuador, Claire Ribando, introduced Paul at the awards sharing, "I think Paul has always had a great faith. I have seen how he has carried it forward in his work, his research, his service, and his travels."


